

Report of the PMA Ratings Chairman:

PMA President brother Dave, executive board, and my brothers all:

Obviously, we have been facing a year unlike any most of us have ever known. With that in mind, my hope is that all brothers are healthy, safe and out of harm's way. We will get through this.

The Ratings for the fiscal year 2019-20 are quite a mixed bag. The pandemic itself did not highly affect the rating outcomes, with only a couple of issues.

- 1. The pandemic onset occurred in mid-March. From that point onward until April 30, 2020, most reporting was sparse and difficult to get. However, the final numbers in the Moose Fiscal year are correct.**
- 2. There was no scoring for the 2020 mid-year, in that it was cancelled.**
- 3. The 4th Quarter HOC report, due in May 15th, 2020, was somewhat affected due to the fact that some Lodges felt they did not have to submit one due to state wide directive on closing.**
- 4. Finally, a number of Lodges did not remit any endowment in April.**

The results of this year's rating were by far the biggest spread of numbers than in any previous year. The top Lodge, which will be announced in brother Steve Krut's Shining Star report amassed 167 points. On the other end of the Spectrum, the last place Lodge in the PMA garnered only 29 points in the entire 2019-20 year.

Of the 117 Lodges in the PMA, 15 Lodges spread out through 8 different Districts ended the year with a green rating. This means that they attained a rating which was at least 80% or better of the top Lodge. In numbers this equated to Lodges which fell into the range of 167 points to 134 points.

There were 23 Lodges in the yellow rating, between 133 points and 117 points, (70% to 79.9% of the top rated Lodge). Finally, 79 Lodges were in the red rating having attained 69.9% or less of the top Lodge score (116 points or less).

An upside to the 2019-20 rating is that 60% of the PMA Lodges scored at least 100 points or better. This was a distinct improvement over previous

years and show that more Lodges are on board with the programs and commitments of Moose International and the PMA.

On a District level, the results are overall slightly higher than previous years. Of the fifteen Districts, 4 were Green District, 1 was yellow and the remaining 10 were red. The top District came in at 142.14 points while the 15th place came in at 79.11 points, again quite a large range.

Finally, I will again remind you to utilize the rating as a **guideline of achievement in your Lodge and your District. Make a **game plan** for where you want to be by year's end by **utilizing the legend** portion of the rating. Look toward **improvements** within categories **over the previous year**.**

In conclusion, the rating for this year shows that the PMA has made improvements overall from previous years on both a Lodge and District level. Participation in our programs (such as conferences and conventions), commitments to our monetary goals and membership show that the PMA is still a strong force in our fraternity. The commitment to One Moose will only strengthen our position as one of the best Moose has to offer.
