#### Greenville Moose Youth Awareness Program

The Greenville Moose Lodge and Chapter boasted another successful year with the youth awareness program.

Six high school students participated and competed for scholarship money ranging from \$100 to \$1,000.

The program entails high school students teaching four-to-nine year olds how to make good living choices in their lives.

All the judging is done by their peers from the eastern side of Pennsylvania.

**Arien Skiba**, a senior at Commodore Perry, won a \$1,000 scholarship.

This is her fourth year participating in the program and taking first place in the western half of the state all four years.

**Emily Sanner**, a sophomore at Commodore Perry, won a \$500 scholarship.

This is her first year in the program, and she plans on participating again next year.

Both Skiba and Sanner will be going on to the international competition in Lisle, Ill., to compete for scholarships ranging from \$2,000 to \$12,000.

**Brittany Reinhart**, a senior from Jamestown, and **Alexis Grinnell**, a senior from Commodore Perry, won \$100 each.

Also participating this year in the program where **Haley Bates**, a sophomore from Commodore Perry, and **Samantha McLaughlin**, a freshman from Jamestown.

In addition to what they won at the state level, all the students earned \$100 for participating and completing their minimum or three "kids talks."

There were 29 "kids talks" given this year that reached 810 youngsters in our community.

The subjects picked by the students to teach were animal safety, exercise, "There is a Light Inside of Us All," bullying prevention, healthy living and fire safety.
